PRESIDENT RAY'S MESSAGE:

As everyone is aware, 2014 has been a tough year for the NFSA, with budget cuts leading to staff reductions and restructuring, a severe cut-back in public programs and the closure of the NFSA shop and restaurant, among other things. It was not the ideal way to celebrate the NFSA's 30th anniversary – but it is not the first occasion the NFSA has had to weather hard times, nor, undoubtedly, will it be the last! The Friends has a modestly sized membership but it has grown during the year, and as well as proposing an expanded range of Friends events to management and being otherwise active behind the scenes, we've managed four member events in Canberra – a lecture presentation as part of an ANU Conference on History and Cinema, a screening of the classic Australia film SMITHY (in conjunction with the Reel McCoy Film Group), the upcoming "Spotlight on Sound" this month, and the "Meet Oscar" white glove evening in August. These are all quite different events and are an indication of the potential range of Friends events in future.

Of course, we are not satisfied to be just arranging members' events, important as those are: we have much more in mind, as is evident from our submission to the Strategic Review.

Perhaps, as we approach the end of the NFSA's 30th year, it's timely to get things in perspective and be reminded of how far the institution has travelled. I particularly commend the TIMELINE on the NFSA's home page (www.nfsa.gov.au) – do check it out! – and for a whiff of real history, the original Cabinet Submission of February 1984 which resulted in the creation of the NFSA is now a public document. Admittedly it takes some perseverance to click through all 34 pages. You can marvel at the modesty of the NFSA's original budget!



This was the scene at our first members-only 'White Glove Event', where film historian Andrew Pike, former Movietone employee Richard Keys and curator Meg Labrum provided a fascinating insight into the world of the newsreel. Damien Parer's Oscar winning newsreel 'Kokoda Front Line' was screened and our audience of Friends was treated to a display of artefacts from the NFSA's collection relating to Ken Hall and Australian film making in the 30s and 40s. It was a great social occasion, with many Friends meeting for the first time and enjoying such a 'special' occasion.









Our next event: 'Spotlight on Sound-Promoting the NFSA's Sound Collection'

Sounds of Australia is the National Film and Sound Archive's program to promote and celebrate the nation's heritage.

Established in 2007, the Sounds of Australia (formerly known as the National Registry of Recorded Sound) is the NFSA's selection of sound recordings with cultural, historical and aesthetic significance and relevance, which inform or reflect life in Australia.

Each year, the Australian public nominates new sounds to be added with final selections determined by a panel of industry experts.

Friends around the Lake workshop

Friends President Ray Edmondson, accompanied by his wife (and Friends member) Sue, participated in a one day workshop held at the National Gallery of Australia and organized by "Friends around the Lake", the grouping of Friends associations of the major cultural institutions in Canberra. The workshop was led by Martin Barden, consultant to the Museum of Contemporary Art in Sydney.

It was a participatory event, with the associations pooling ideas about their membership schemes, their successes and failures, the benefits offered, and such indicators as "retention rates", membership "churn" and the collection and analysis of data about members and their preferences. Interestingly, it became clear that it is not just "benefits" - like discounts in institutional shops or entrance to events – that attracted members. It was often, equally, a desire to support the institution in question in its work and to serve as volunteers – an increasingly important issue as government subsidies shrink and institutions have to look to their support bases for alternative resources.

The Tate Gallery in London was presented as a case study: in 10 years its membership base grew from 30,000 to 100,000. While few Australian institutions can aspire to such numbers, it nevertheless emphasizes how far we all have room to grow.
