They could ride, muster, brand, pioneer bush settlements, endure fire, flood and drought; and with it all be helpmate, mother and lover. Sometimes desperate, often defiant, and always brave, the girls of the bush were distinctive characters in early Australian cinema. Across four decades from 1910-1950 Australian film goers were treated to a succession of bush heroines in *The Romantic Story of Margaret Catchpole* (1911), A Girl of the Bush (1921), The Squatter's Daughter (1933) and The Overlanders (1946). In these decades, too, the stalwart Rudd women took us onto their selection. This illustrated talk will saddle up with the actresses who rendered these memorable characters in scenes of action and adventure.

Following is a review of the latest DVD releases by President Ray.

RAY'S CRITIC'S COMMENTS ON NEW DVD RELEASES:

Wearing my other hat as NFSA Curator Emeritus, can I enthuse about three new NFSA product releases on DVD?

MARCO POLO JUNIOR VERSUS THE RED DRAGON (1972) Despite its awkward title, this is a landmark in Australian film history: our first cartoon feature. It was made by the pioneering Eric Porter Studios in Sydney and it was a huge achievement in a country where animation has always struggled for its place in the sun. It has all the ingredients: an appealing hero and heroine, a truly nasty villain, and some offbeat animal characters that will engage you.

SMITHY (1946) Ken G Hall's last film is an epic biopic about the life of Sir Charles Kingsford Smith. It stars Ron Randell and Muriel Steinbeck, and features John Stannage, Captain P G Taylor and former Prime Minister W M 'Billy' Hughes playing themselves as their parts in Smithy's story unfolds. The epic first crossing of the Pacific Ocean in 1928, and the later crossing of the Tasman Sea in the failing Southern Cross, are grippingly recreated. The music score by Henry Krips and Alfred Hill, performed by the Sydney Symphony Orchestra, is memorable. To capture the aerial shots for the film, the Southern Cross was flown for the very last time, before becoming a museum exhibit.

RANGLE RIVER (1936) Based on a story by Zane Grey and starring Victor Jory, this is a kind of Australian western. It's interesting as an element in the continuing interaction between Australia and Hollywood which has always been a feature of our film industry. The plot includes a fierce duel with stockwhips, which led to the film being cleverly retitled for its American release as MEN WITH WHIPS.



Who was JP McGowan?

Friends who were able to attend film historian David Donaldson's morning presentation in the Arc Cinema on 24 February had a memorable glimpse into the life of the first Australian to make the "big time" in Hollywood. McGowan was a prolific maker of film serials during the silent era, and was active in various areas of the American film industry almost until his death in 1952. The entire first episode of McGowan's early sound serial, THE HURRICANE EXPRESS (1932) — featuring a very youthful John Wayne — was posted on the Friends' Facebook page, and the number of "views" reached well into four figures.

The little known story of the interplay between the Australian film industry and Hollywood before the second World War is a fascinating one, and it is tracked in the NFSA collection. Did you know that Hollywood fixtures Errol Flynn, Cecil Kellaway, Constance Worth and Ann Richards were Australians, and made their first films in Sydney? Or that Hollywood stars Lloyd Hughes, Charles Farrell and Helen Twelvetrees were imported to star in Australian films in the 1930s?

'Little Pattie' becomes a Patron of the Friends:

Patricia Amphlett OAM is the Friends' newest patron. Under the stage name of "Little Pattie", Patricia was one of Australia's best-known singing stars in the 1960s and 1970skm. She later moved on to adult contemporary music, and with

other entertainers she sang in the famous "It's Time" television commercial for the 1972 Federal election campaign. She has served as the National President of the Media, Entertainment and Arts Alliance, as Vice President of Actors Equity, on the Council of the Australian War Memorial (1995-1998) and on the Board of the NFSA (2011 to 2014). Patricia was inducted into the Australian Recording Industry Association (ARIA) Hall of Fame in 2009. We are delighted that she has accepted the position of Patron of the FNFSA.

Published under the headline 'Efficiency dividends' ignore government duty of care - letters, Canberra Times, 13 February

I have lost count of the number of "efficiency dividend" cuts imposed on our national memory institutions by both Liberal and Labor governments, but they have long ceased to have anything to do with either efficiency or dividends ("Capital cops it as more jobs go", February 11, p1). Our stressed institutions are losing hard-won expertise as staff numbers and budgets decline. They can cope only by closing functions, reducing access and failing to acquire what should be preserved. As their communities rally to help, volunteers and corporate sponsors can assist. But this cannot, and should not, relieve government of its fundamental duty of care for the national memory and national treasures.

As Lloyd George once said, "national culture and identity is too important to leave to the politicians". The Prime Minister's dream of an innovation nation is hardly compatible with a mindset, which regards cultural institutions as an expense instead of an investment. Compared with the untaxed profits being offshored by multinationals, harming our institutions contributes next to nothing in the budget balance sheet
